“... to preserve items relevant to the Bexley Community ...”

The Bexley Historical Society’s mission, in part, is “to preserve items relevant to the heritage of the Bexley community.” It’s fitting that this dedicated group of volunteers saved a historic 1920s home within “inches” of demolition, thanks in part to a swimming pool.

This summer marks the 10th anniversary of the David H. Madison Community Swimming Pool. When the old pool was razed, the architects and construction workers used the caretaker’s cottage on Jeffrey Mansion grounds as their office. The plan was to demolish the long-vacant structure after completion of the pool. Meanwhile, the Bexley Historical Society had functioned out of a small room in city hall with files, photos and artifacts stored in various places in city hall and Jeffrey Mansion. With Jeffrey Mansion requiring that storage space for its own use, the Bexley Historical



Society needed a new home. Barbara Hysell, then president of the Society, approached Mayor Madison with the idea of moving into the Jeffrey Mansion caretaker’s cottage. Bexley Historical Society Founder and Cottage Director Edie May Herrel spoke to City Council, who approved the decision to lease the cottage to the Historical Society. The Historical Society appreciates that Mayor Madison and Barbara Hysell had the foresight to see the potential of the property. Through many donations of time and materials, volunteers made much needed repairs and upgrades to

the structure. The society welcomed their first visitors on July 4, 2006 at an Open House.

However, as all owners of older homes know, the work is never done. Recently the City of Bexley made several improvements to the building. They removed overgrown shrubbery from the west side of the house and replanted the area. The mailbox was cemented into place and board member Glenn Soden painted it. The back porch was upgraded with new low-rise concrete steps and a hand railing. Plans are under way by the Society to remove and replace rotten wood cornices, repair the front porch, and re-glaze some windows. As the Bexley Historical Society celebrates 10 years in its current home, the Board thanks all those who have helped save and improve the cottage.

New Neighborhood Houses Open on Christmas Day





● The Drexel, newest of the W. C. Chesbrough chain of suburban theaters, is to have its formal opening Christmas afternoon. First film to be shown will be "One Mile from Heaven." On Sunday the screen program will be topped by Irene Dunne in "The Awful Truth."

Later this summer, when patrons of the Drexel Theatre can visit again, they will walk up under the glow of replaced neon marquee lights and colored lights behind the glass block, while looking up to the rehabbed original ceiling. As they enter, they will step onto original terrazzo flooring. As they proceed, they can order concessions from a new counter fitting the Art Deco style of the building. These are highlights among the many renovations the Friends of the Drexel group are undertaking. The Drexel was built in 1937 and was renovated in 1981 and 1991. It was listed to the National Register of

Historical Places in 2015, which allowed the theatre to apply for historic tax credits. Additional support for the renovation came from local citizens, the Bexley Community Foundation, Franklin County, the City of Bexley and the State of Ohio.

One of Bexley’s landmarks, the Drexel Theatre, is featured on the cover of *Images of America / Bexley*. The book may be purchased at the historical society, book stores and at Amazon.com.



Bexley Celebrates Life of Robert Hutchins “Tad” Jeffrey II

Perhaps no family is as synonymous with Bexley as the Jeffreys. On February 13, 2016, the community lost a prominent life-long resident when Tad Jeffrey passed away. Born on June 23, 1929, Tad attended Bexley’s Cassingham Elementary school and graduated in 1947 from Columbus Academy.

After graduating from Williams College, earning his MBA from Harvard Business School, and serving as a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy during the Korean War, Tad and his beloved wife, Nancy Kittredge Jeffrey returned to Columbus to join the family business, Jeffrey Manufacturing Company, of which he eventually became President. Later, the Jeffrey Company became a private investment company, from which he retired in 2000. Tad and Nancy raised their four children in Bexley, where members of the Jeffrey family have lived for over 110 years.

The Jeffrey Mansion, one of the hubs of the town, was built in 1903-1905 by Tad’s grandfather, Robert Hutchins Jeffrey, who was instrumental in founding Bexley in 1908. The family donated the home, known as Kelvedon, and its 34 acres of surrounding park land to Bexley in 1941. The Bexley Historical Society, located on this land, benefitted from Tad’s interest in history. In the late 1800s, on what is now Wolfe Park, a farmer discovered artifacts from the Adena people who lived along Alum Creek as far back as 1 A.D.

The Ohio History Connection, held the items until the Bexley Historical Society could provide a secure display area. Tad and Nancy Jeffrey, along with Jill Jeffrey Kingsley and Joseph A. Jeffrey, Jr., funded the construction of the display so that visitors may view the Adena artifacts.

Tad Jeffrey worked to improve his community. In Bexley specifically, Tad participated in a group that built and operated the Bexley pool. His passion for education called him to serve on the boards of Capital University, Columbus Academy, and Columbus School for Girls. A recent, generous donation by the Jeffreys helped fund new athletic and arts centers at CSG. Tad also served on the Board of Directors of the Bexley Community Foundation. He will be missed, but Tad’s involvement will continue to shape many of the things that make Bexley great.

Interview With Dr. Janet Bez Ebert

Janet Bez Ebert, a 1953 graduate of Bexley High School went on to earn a B.S. in 1958, M.S. in 1962, and Ph.D in 1973 from O.S.U. Her degrees were in music education with minors in several areas. Now retired, she had a very distinguished career in music education. During the time Janet was an undergrad at O.S.U., women were not a part of the marching band, but she was in the Concert Band. She was TBDBITL Alumni Club, Inc.(OSU Marching Band) secretary, 1972—1993 and has served as the organization’s Historian from 1993 to present.

Janet said, “I will be forever grateful that I lived my entire youth in the Bexley community.” She treasures her life-long friendships.

of the photo, Janet and three of her friends with their sports equipment. She identified the girls as a Lutheran, one from an atheist family, a Jew, and a Catholic and stated, “This is how we do things in America—a togetherness in our community.”

Norwood's Amusement Park was located on the south side of East Main Street and ran just west of where Alum Creek Drive is now. The park came into existence in the late 1940s and was demolished in 1965. Alum Creek Drive did not exist at this time or location. The demolition of the park was related in no small part to the building of the freeway.

Jeffrey Mansion Display

Photos from the historical society's collection along with several pieces of Edie Mae Herrel's drawings are on display at the Jeffrey Mansion. Of special interest are photos of Robert and Alice Jeffrey along with their children both inside the residence and on the porch. Included in the display is the home of Maurice S. and Mary Ellen Connors (78 North Parkview), the grandparents of Barbara Drugan. "Miss Barbara" was a highly respected kindergarten teacher in the Bexley schools. Another home shown and referred to as the Daugherty Mansion at 46 North Parkview became the headquarters of Major General Henry Axline during the mobilization of troops for the Spanish-American War.
